The Willington Academy (1804)

Willington was once home to a prestigious boarding school for young men. The Willington Academy was founded in 1804 by Presbyterian minister Dr. Moses Waddel. The rustic setting, combined with a rigorous education, molded many of the South's future leaders, including eleven governors, three U.S. vice presidents, and eight college presidents. The diorama of the school and other artifacts make up a corner of the History Center.

Special Collections

African American History

Four panels describing prominent African American history sites in South Carolina, plus a collection of African American literature.

The Cowan Family String Band

A unique collection of Cowan Family musical instruments and photographs.

The Wright Andrews Country Store

An exhibit of items typical of those sold in Willington stores from 1897-1975. This exhibit honors Wright Andrews, Sr., a Willington store owner from 1933-1975.

Vintage Quilts

Willington quilts date back to the Civil War. The History Center is on the South Carolina Quilt Trail featuring unique heritage quilt pieces transformed into art.

Historic Time Magazines

A special treat for history buffs, the opportunity to browse through a display of Time magazines from 1937 - 1952.

Our History

Daniel P. Juengst Railroad and Post Office Building

- Houses a model village of Willington as a 1915 railroad town complete with working HO scale train and other railroad artifacts.
- Exhibits the original post office boxes, vintage letters, and other postal memorabilia.

"Painting a Brighter Future" Mural

- Displayed in the open breezeway, a collection of twelve mural panels celebrating Willington history.
- Created by McCormick artist Jeffrey Callaham with the assistance of McCormick County students.

African American Cultural Center

Step inside the renovated Green Olive School House to see what a one-room school was like in 1920. Displays include authentic African American artifacts.

Carolina Fence Garden and Gazebo

Utilizing very basic elements, the Carolina Fence™ incorporates both natural and cultural elements designated as symbols of our state. Included are the following items and plants:
